**CINDER:** Cinder is not a wolf/dog. She is at WolfWood through one of the many ways we network with the La Plata County Humane Society. Cinder got her foot crushed in a coyote trap. The shelter kept her for almost a year trying to find her a good home, but no one wanted her. Not wanting to put her down, the shelter called and asked if she could come here. Because she had the right type of fur to live outside, we said yes. That was back in 2008, and Cinder has been part of the "pack" ever since. She became a "hospice" companion to one of our older animals with cancer. She brought him presents and he gave her kisses. After 2 years, he finally passed and Cinder got another older animal to take care of. After being his friend to the end, she now lives with Tacoma. Cinder is almost 9, and as you can tell, a sweet and loving animal who takes good care of her wolf/dog friends

**TACOMA:** Tacoma is a 13 year old, low percentage wolf/dog that came here in 2003 from a private party in Bloomfield. He is shy but sweet and is scared of strangers. In his younger days he liked to fence fight, but is much calmer with his friend Cinder

# **IN LOVING MEMORY**

Ateria: Ateria was a shy female that came to WolfWood in 2002. She was 16 and went very peacefully. She used to live with Saber and then with Johnny. She loved to dig dens and be in charge. We will miss her sweet face.

**Bruno**: Bruno was a gentle giant and a favorite here at the refuge. He was a big, strong affectionate animal. He loved everybody and looked forward to children coming to visit him even at the end when he was hurting. Bruno was 13 and already had one operation to help his cancer. He had lived with many different animals and most recently, Trucker. His smile and heart will be missed.

Nomad: Nomad was 13. He had been catch-poled on two sides and dragged until he bled. He had been on a chain his whole life and was in shock when he came to us in 2004. Nomad finally warmed up to people, but he would not let anyone touch his neck. He had a bad heart condition and Dr. Wagner said it would be a kindness to let him go. He was a rough and tumble guy, and enjoyed a big juicy bone until the very end.

**Isis**: Isis was our oldest animal at almost 17. She came to us in 2005 and was the last of her original pack to be still with us. She was a very shy animal but still the boss of 3 other animals even at her advanced age. She died in her sleep one night. Her family will miss her.

Simmone: Simmone was 16 and had cancer. She lived with Zion and Athena. We have many old animals that have difficulty getting up or moving much. This causes them to literally freeze to the ground in winter. Simmone was one of these animals and she was ready for her passing, even if we weren't.

**Domino**: Domino was the last of our original 9 pack. He was born at the Refuge in 1995. He has lived the last 2 years with Trinity. Domino was a shy animal, but lived a long and happy life. We mourn his loss and also the loss of the last animal from our beginnings.
