KODIAK AND JILL

Jill and Kodiak came from the Olympic Animal Sanctuary in Washington that was shut down for animal cruelty. The animals were kept in small crates stacked in a warehouse. The owner operated unchecked until pictures were put on the web and a campaign started to shut him down. An organization called The Guardians of Rescue brokered a deal and all the animals were dropped off near Kingman, AZ. A visitor to the refuge recommended us and we were asked to take Jill and Kody, the two wolf/dogs. When we arrived they were still scared and confused. Kody jumped immediately into the truck, but Jill had to be muzzled and carried. It only took a few short weeks for them to totally acclimate to their new environment. They have made a fast physical recovery, but more amazing is the speed that they bounced back to being happy and interactive animals. While still a little cautious around strangers, they are totally in love with the volunteers and will greet visitors who are gentle and patient. We are very happy they are safe and have a permanent home here with us.

SUMMER EVENTS

If you would like to meet some of our animals in person, here is a list of our upcoming events. July 26th & 27th: Hermit Park. Hermit Park Open Space Pavilion is beautiful once again this year and hosting WolfWood. Education programs will be at 10am and 7pm each day, wolves will be available to visit both days from 9:30-8pm. Vet bills: As you can see we have many new animals coming in, and many others have passed on. Almost all of these cases involved extensive medical care for their rehabilitation and care. We started out the year with a zero balance, but even with trying to keep up and the patience of our amazing vet, our bill is currently almost \$3,000.00. Any donation sent especially for this purpose would really help us continue to give our animals the highest quality care possible.

Archie: Archie came from Aztec NM. His owner had rescued him, but Archie could not be contained. He got out and was too smart to be recaptured and ran around Aztec, causing no harm. Tina and the folks at the animal shelter tried to catch him for several weeks, even buying a special net gun. He still evaded all attempts until Craig went down with our new dart gun and sedated him with the first shot. He was taken to the shelter and neutered. He was transported here and lives with Phaedra. He is handsome, sweet and curious. He is under 2 years old and still very shy.

Finn: Finn came from the Aztec Shelter. He was the most starved animal we have seen yet. He was very abused and punished when he tried to eat, so he wouldn't even take hotdogs from us. He also has vision problems and can only see blurs. He is slowly making a physical recovery and now enjoys his food and treats. He is very gentle and sweet and has finally realized he is safe so we can now get him a pen mate. Although not a wolf, he is a favorite already and he travels with us to events

Sammy: Sammy is a very unsocial lab/mix. He also is an escape artist. He was sent to the Adams County Shelter after a hoarding situation was shut down. He was considered unadoptable and was recommended for euthanasia. The shelter kept him for over 4 months looking for a place for him. WolfWood agreed to accept him at the request of our state inspector. He has become a friend to Cinder, who has made him feel safe and wanted among the wolves!

Aldo: Aldo was living in a car with his owner, who contacted us and said he couldn't keep him anymore. He took Aldo to the La Plata Humane Society, where he was neutered and given his shots. Trinity is very excited to have him as her new pen mate and they are completely bonded. We expect him to live a long and happy life at WolfWood. He is still quite shy, but very loving, and we are working on his socialization. He is just a year old.

Sheba: Sheba is an 8 year old female wolf/dog. She came to us from a local woman who got divorced and no longer had a place to keep her. She is a happy and friendly girl who likes everybody.

Piper: Piper was also an extremely starved and abused animal. She was misidentified as a 12 year old wolf/dog, but is really a very small husky mix. She came from the Cortez Animal Shelter where she was going to be put down. After an extensive vet visit, we discovered she is around 8 years old and can be saved with proper care. Dr. Wagner is very happy with her progress and she is ready to move out of the hospital pen.

IN LOVING MEMORY

Tacoma: Tacoma passed away one night last November at the age of 13. He came to us in 2003 from Farmington. Tacoma was shy and let Cinder, his pen-mate, take the lead. She mourned him for a long time. We will too.

Zion: Zion was one of our premier ambassadors. He loved children and went to all of our events until he got too old. After he retired he was still a visitor favorite. His gentle nature and wonderful smile is still missed by everyone he met. He passed away at age 13 last winter. He was a joy to be around and leaves a large empty place filled only by his memory.

Nokomo: Nokomo was 13 when he died last March due to kidney failure. He arrived at WolfWood in 2003 with his father, Shilo. He was a great example of a big male wolf. When his father died Nokomo was put in with Nova. They were very happy for years together. He had been through a lot before WolfWood and was a testament to the resiliency of our animals. We will miss his rough and tumble style.

Little Timber: Little Timber was one of the three remaining wolves we moved from Pagosa and was on the cover of our original brochure. He came to us in 2001 and was almost 15 when he died in April. He had many different pen-mates, most recently Minnie. He lived a long and peaceful life at the refuge.

Lakota: Lakota passed away at the age of 15. In his younger days he was an escape artist. Age and his partner, Tavi, slowed him down a little. He was shy, but got petted by his favorite volunteers. He arrived shortly after we moved to Ignacio in 2002. He was very sweet and has gone on to be with his former pack members.

Nova: Nova was a beautiful, strong and willful wolf/dog. She was one of our best singers. She was lonely after Nokomo died and we were remodeling her pen to accommodate her possible new friend, Finn. Nova was only 8 when she died unexpectedly of a massive brain hemorrhage in May. Paula held her and talked to her until the end. She as well as Dr. Wagner and Craig all put up a valiant fight but it was just too much. Her beautiful voice is missed every sunset. She and Nokomo can join each other once again.

Adamma: Just a few days after we lost Nova, we lost Adamma. While not quite as unexpected, since he was over 15, it was still very hard. Again, Paula held him as he passed, with Ben there to help. He arrived in 2005. He was gentle and sweet to everyone, but did not want to be in with any other animal until the last year of his life when he chose Stella as his friend. He passed in his home surrounded by love.

Slyla: Skyla arrived from Best Friends in 2004 with her son Kewa. She was 15, but you would never know it by her puppy face and bouncy step. She lived at the top of the hill in a pen we called "the palace." It had a large rock where Skyla greeted all the school children and visitors who came to the refuge. Everyone got face kisses, and she was often the most visited animal here and definitely had the most "selfies" taken. She went down one feeding day. When we took her to the vet, we discovered she had lung cancer. She was spending the night for more tests the next day, but as usual, Skyla made her own choice and left us the next morning. Her energy was undeniable.

Cloud Dancer: Cloud Dancer came to us as a small puppy. Her people skills and loving ways allowed her to live with longtime volunteer Barb. Cloud was a happy and beautiful animal who loved the water and loved life. She is missed by us, but most of all by her best friend Barb, who gave her a wonderful home.
